LCCC recognises the important part that local groups can play in developing strong, united & connected communities. The entire council has a higher proportion of residents from a Protestant community background (49%) and have range of community organisations, some of which are single identity and will cater mainly for that group Following this grouping, the proportion of residents and communities identifying as Catholic (24.0%), none (25%) and other (2%). (Census 2021)
Political Opinion	This project is open to all eligible community/voluntary sector organisations to apply with successful applicant being identified through an agreed eligibility criterion, regardless of political opinion.
Racial Group	The Council area has a minority of BME residents and there are a number of support organisations across the area. According to the 2021 Census, 87 % of LCCC population were born in N Ireland.
